#### \* Veterans Month Highlight (July) - ASAE Fellow Jimmy Butt

In honor of Veterans Month, we honor Jimmy Butt, 1965 ASAE Fellow, for his service to our country and our profession.

When ASAE Fellow Jimmy Butt graduated from Auburn University in February of 1943, the United States was in the midst of World War II. Being an ROTC member, he was inducted and sent to Officer Candidate School (OCS) to prepare to serve in the war. He was assigned in Field Artillery to the 63<sup>rd</sup> Infantry Division that went to Europe in Christmas of 1944 where they breached the famous Siegfried Line and "rat raced" into Germany down toward Austria. When the atom bomb dropped and the war ended, he transferred into U.S. Military Government to help re-build the German government and then returned to Auburn University to pursue his Masters Degree. After graduation, Jimmy worked as a research engineer for the Agricultural Engineering Department at Auburn University for ten years. In 1956, he was chosen as the Executive Vice President of ASAE in St. Joseph, Michigan, the position that he retired from after thirty years. Along the way he was honored to serve as the President of ASAE (now ASABE, President of the National Council of Engineering and Scientific Society

Executives, President of both the Auburn and St. Joseph Lions Clubs, and he received Auburn's outstanding Alumni Award from the College of Engineering in 1968. If you would like to contact Iimmy, he can be e-mailed at iimmybutt@webty.net.

#### \* Butte College and the Butte County Fires - by Bruce Enyeart

During the recent Butte County fires, Butte College's Heavy Equipment Operation program, in coordination with facilities management, maintains firebreaks around the campus. It primarily involves bulldozing a path around the campus perimeters. The campus was not in too much danger. The two staging areas in Butte County were the Silver Dollar Fairgrounds in Chico, and Butte College where 1,300 firefighters and emergency vehicles (including bulldozers, transports, mobile kitchens, fuel depots, and fire trucks) were staged. In anticipation of the fire danger and the need to clear the space for staging, the campus was closed on the morning of Day 2, Thursday.

Our busy project schedule precluded student involvement, so Ag/Heavy Equipment support technician, Salen Lor, was a great help. On Day 2 of the Humboldt Fire, as 30-40mph winds whipped the fire toward campus from the northwest origin very near Chico, we were asked to widen the breaks at some critical points. Salen kindly dressed the breaks around our solar panel installations, water wells, and outlying structures and they worked as designed, preventing the fires from reaching the buildings and campus proper. They also enabled the firefighters to backfire some areas to remove fuels ahead of the fast-moving flames.

By Day 8 (Wednesday, June 18), staff and students were informed that work and classes on the main campus resumed (while classes at our remote sites were unaffected). A few emergency vehicles and personnel were still on-site.

Neither structures nor facilities were damaged by the fires but, tragically, our beautiful oak and gray pine woodlands and grasslands suffered heavily. I hope that some of the oaks survive on our primarily wild 928 acre campus. Also, though many of the staff were displaced by evacuations, only a few of their homes were lost and there were no fatalities. We realize the extraordinary efforts of the fire teams that pitched in from California, Oregon, and Nevada. We (the Ag & Heavy Equipment staff) are happy to have made any contribution we could to the successful outcome.
