# 'CLAAS' Farming 4.0 and a Global Perspective on International Agribusiness Mauri Saltz (President, ASABE and CLAAS Omaha, Inc.)

Mauri Salz grew up on a family farm in Northwest Iowa and still participates in his families' corn and soybean farming operations. He has worked for CLAAS 18 years and will provide insights into the CLAAS Farming 4.0 way of thinking, about precision farming, big data, and the worldwide relationships that are needed to develop products and processes to support the complex farming operations of the future. Maury will also give an update on how ASABE is working to support 5 major goals which will support Agricultural and Biological Engineers into the future.

- Dr. Balaji Seth introduced the keynote speaker, President Maury Salz. Mr. Salz address can be split into 3 sections:

## 1. AETC 2020 and AIM 2021 Events in CA-NV Section

The annual Agricultural Equipment Technology Conference has been held in Louisville, KY for many many years. Last year the venue was changed to a new one in Louisville, the Omni Hotel. The change was successful. ASABE is giving the CA-NV section the opportunity to host it in 2020. The AETC event has been held in Louisville, KY in part because the timing of it is usually just before the National Farm Machinery Show in Louisville, one of the largest indoor farm expos in the country. Tulare or its vicinity is the proposed location for AETC 2020 to take advantage of the World Ag Expo. Maury Salz requested that CA-NV section officers reach out to Scott Frost, Vice Chair of the AETC planning committee to discuss planning in California.

After Boston, the next ASABE Annual International Meeting (AIM) will be held in Omaha, Nebraska (2020), which is President's Salz own region. In 2021, AIM will be hosted in Anaheim, CA, and President Salz suggested that planning cycle for AIM events should take place 2 years prior to the event rather than 1 year. The number of attendees in this past meeting in Detroit was 1,740. The goal is to increase that number every year.

# 2. Brief biography and CLAAS Farming 4.0

President Salz then moved on to the main portion of his keynote speech, to talk about his career in agriculture, the non-traditional route that he took, and his

company, CLAAS Omaha, Inc. He grew up on his family farm in Northwest Iowa. He had a nonlinear career in that he left the agriculture field for a while to work in the aeronautical industry. He has been with CLAAS for 18 years and is now President of the company. One of his career goals was to be President of ASABE, because of his desire to give back to the field, to be an agent of change and action. He began planning to take up this role about 10 years ago until he was able to create the right conditions to take up the role and give it the time and attention necessary to lead ASABE. President Salz went on to describe the 4 different farming revolutions, hence the name CLAAS Farming 4.0. He informed the audience that priorities for farmers in the US don't necessarily match the priorities of those in Europe. An example, being the use of GPS technology and the cloud, which US farmers are comfortable with but those in Europe are resistant to, due to privacy concerns.

# 3. State of the Society

President Salz closed his speech by talking about ASABE and the State of our Professional Society. His focus as the president of ASABE is to grow and sponsor.

At the end of his keynote address, Dr. Seth and Dr. Liu thanked him for his presence and speech and gave him a gift on behalf of the section.
